Upon roll call the following Commissioners were present: Commissioners Bob Dixon, Harold Bengsch and Lincoln Hough.

Commissioner Dixon called the session to order. Commissioner Dixon led the Pledge of Allegiance and prayer.

Missouri Job Center update was given by Maryann Rojas. Rojas informed Commission that the Job Center recently had its largest change one thousand graduation of 50 people. An award was given for the Build my Future event which is the 1st award given in the nation. A new grant called Americas Promise will provide assistance in tuition for over 300 individuals. 01/23 will be the 1st forum about the legalization of medical marijuana.

Missouri Extension Center Report Update Was provided by Dave Burton. Burton distributed to the Commission the monthly newsletter. Today the new juvenile staff member who will educate juveniles on 4H will begin work. Burton highlighted some upcoming programs offered by the extension office which included: taking people with you on 01/24, Spring Calving on 01/22, Blueberry school 02/22 and 02/23. Master Gardener in February.

Top Branch Awards were presented to the following employees: Connie Yen with Archives, Hannah Porter with Juvenile, Kate Morris with Commission and Rick Artman with Highway.

County Administrator Chris Coulter updated the Commission with numbers from the Medical Examiner's office, 129 autopsies for 2018. Coulter updated Commission on Pretrial numbers as well, he stated that 140 clients are currently under supervision. Commission was reminded of the BOA session tomorrow 01/08 @ 9:30 in room 212.

Highway Director Rick Artman presented the Commission with the December monthly report. Artman went on to highlight various projects from: district 1 crew, district 2 crew, county wide maintenance crew, and special project crew. Artman updated on shop and warehouse and parts department. Commissioner Bengsch paid compliment to the hard work that the highway department puts in. Bengsch went on to compliment the roadways in Greene County.

Artman presented information on Emergency Overtime Pay. Artman went on to explain to the Commission that in years past highway has requested the employees who work emergency overtime or emergency callout they have the option to request pay in lieu of comp time. Artman explained that while most employees prefer the comp time as people enjoy extra time off when the weather is nice, he explained it isn't possible to always honor all requests. On average the last 5 years payout is usually around 18k, budgets for 40k. Commissioner Lincoln Hough moved to approve Emergency Overtime Pay for 2019. Commissioner Harold Bengsch seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved. AYE: Dixon, Bengsch and Hough. Nay: None Abstain: None Absent: None.

Resource Management director Kevin Barnes briefed the Commission with 2018 numbers for the code compliance office, 407 new cases and 440 closed cases, current open cases were 157. Barnes gave campus project updates one of which included the Judicial Facility. Currently

there will be work on Friday evening and Saturday to reduce the noise interruption for the judges.

County Geologist Matt Forir gave an update on the 911 cave/geo-hazard map. Once this map system is completed Greene County will be the first in the world to have such a database. Commissioner Dixon gave compliment to Forir and all the staff for their hard work and dedication.

Director of Building Regulations Dave O'Dell distributed the monthly report for December. O'Dell went on to highlight the report and is hopeful that 2019 will be a better year in terms of numbers and revenue.

Director of OEM Larry Woods provided the Commission with the December End of the Month Report. Woods informed commission of 2 tours in December which totaled over 51 people, recently made application for \$30, 000.00 EMPG mini grant and went on to highlight other information from the report.

Planning Director Kent Morris provided report to Commission. Morris went on to highlight the report for December as well at YTD numbers which included Final plat category and lot number which increased by a lot from 2017. Morris went on to explain that in 2019 prelim plats will be one of the greatest increases since 2009.

Dixon read brief legal statement before the zoning cases.

OPERATIONS:

The maintenance crews have been involved in routine activities including the following:

DISTRICT 1 CREW

- Crews replaced driveway drainage pipes and cleaned debris from the ditches on FR 119 and FR 133.
- Crews performed shoulder improvement work on FR 26.
- The Brush crew responded to requests of service at the following locations: FR 25, FR 112, FR 97, and FR 68.
- Trees were removed on FR 119 for ditch improvements and crews removed a dead tree on FR 46. Tree stumps were ground on FR 101.
- Crews cleaned-up trees and brush debris from the right-of-way due to high winds across the district.
- Crews performed crack seal operations in various subdivisions and on FR 44.
- Crews repaired potholes in the roadway on FR 103.
- Other tasks for the month included: mowing, trash and animal removal, street sweeping, inspections and maintenance of equipment, etc.

DISTRICT 2 CREW

• Crews milled headers on FR 84, FR 94 and FR 205 in preparation of hot mix paving. The roads were "cut" due to culvert and pipe installations.

- Crews finished a right-of-way project on FR 68. The fencerow was dozed out, finish grading was completed, and seed and straw was placed over the work area.
- Crews repaired soft spots in the roadway on FR 134 and repaved these areas. The backhoe crew also repaired a soft spot on Primrose Lane. The area was excavated, filled-in with 4" x 6" rock and capped with asphalt millings. It will be paved at a later date.

#### **FACTS:**

- 1. The 2.6 acre subject property lies at the southeast corner of Highland Springs Boulevard and US Highway 60. It is an original component of the Highland Springs development and has served as the sales office for nearly 30 years. The lower level of the structure includes some ancillary space for servicing the adjacent golf course.
- 2. The applicant's representative is under contract to purchase the tract and would like to operate a business leasing suites for individual owner/operators to conduct personal wellness businesses centered around salon, massage, beauty, and other spa treatments in a shared environment. The applicant operates a similar business currently inside the city limits of Springfield.
- 3. Highland Springs was first permitted as a development under Planning Board case PB 836 in 1987, and the 2.6 acre subject property was permitted to be used as a sales office only. In 1989 the PAD was amended (PB 904) to allow, among other things, the sales office to utilize a private septic tank on a temporary basis. The sales office would be required to connect to public sewer whenever the office and commercial areas west of Highland Springs Boulevard are developed. After much of the Highland Springs property developed in the ensuring years, the PAD was amended again in 2010 to allow O-1 Professional Office uses to operate within the existing sales office (PB 1797).
- 4. The proposed personal wellness uses are not permitted in the O-1 Professional Office zoning district. Such uses are first mentioned in the C-1 Neighborhood Commercial District as follows: "Personal service establishments including beauty parlors, barber shops, dry cleaning and laundry pickup, shoe repair, self-service laundromats, and other services deemed by the County Commission to be of the same nature as outlined by the Statement of Intent."
- Greene County Planning Division staff believe the proposed uses fit more closely with those outlined in the C-1 Neighborhood Commercial District, and the applicant has therefore applied to amend the PAD to include such uses as permissible.

- 6. The immediate area to the south and east of the subject property consists of the Highland Springs golf course and a single family residential development. To the west of the property lies the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame, and further to the west along Stan Musial Boulevard lies the last undeveloped portion of Highland Springs which is zoned for commercial, office, and hotel uses.
- 7. The surrounding area along US Highway 60 to the east and west is developing according to the Greene County Land Use Plan with mixed uses adjacent to the highway. To the north and east there are additional commercial and retail uses at Farm Road 189. Land at this corner was recently rezoned to C-2 General Commercial as part of a proposed office and commercial development.
- 8. C-1 Neighborhood Commercial uses require both public water and sewer to operate. All public utilities are available to the property and a connection to public water and sanitary sewer services for all uses will be required. A sketch plat has been submitted to Greene County Planning Division showing preliminary locations for a public sewer extension.
- 9. Access to the property comes primarily from Highland Springs Boulevard, which connects directly to US Highway 60 via an at-grade intersection. Stan Musial Boulevard provides an alternate route out of the Highland Springs development to the south and west at Evans Road. Greene County Highway Department has not requested a traffic study for the proposed commercial uses.
- 10. There are no areas of floodplain or sinkhole on the subject property.
- 11. The 2009 Future Land Use Map shows this property to be located in an area suitable for mixed uses. It is within the Urban Service Area of Springfield.

#### **DIVISION COMMENTS:**

Staff believes the addition of limited personal wellness uses is in step with the intent of the original PAD zoning on the property, and complements the additional commercial uses that are already zoned but yet to be developed west of Highland Springs Boulevard. C-1 Neighborhood Commercial uses are defined as "individual or small groups of retail and customer service establishments benefitting local residential neighborhoods." The regulations further define such uses as being located on higher-classification streets and not generating substantially increased traffic to residential neighborhoods. The types of uses proposed would be targeted at a local market and would not generate additional traffic inside the Highland Springs neighborhood owing to the sales office's location outside the gated subdivision. Staff is keenly aware that the intersection of Highland Springs Boulevard and Highway 60 is not ideal in terms of safety and traffic flow, but does not believe the proposed PAD amendment would make this intersection substantially worse. Staff is therefore in support of this PAD amendment with conditions.


#### PLANNING BOARD ACTION:

Greene County Planning Board did vote (8-0) during public hearing on December 18, 2018 to recommend approval of the request with the following conditions:

- 1. The following C-1 Neighborhood Commercial District uses shall be permitted on this property:
  - a. Personal service establishments including beauty parlors, barber shops, salons, massage treatments, spa treatments, skincare, nail treatments, therapists, licensed professional counselors, and other similar uses as determined by the Resource Management Director
- 2. The following uses will not be permitted:
  - a. Addiction treatment programs and services, rehabilitation services, psychiatric services
  - b. All other C-1 Neighborhood Commercial Uses
- 3. The property must be connected to public sanitary sewer and public water before any of the uses above may commence.
- 4. Condition 2 of PB 1797 remains in effect and shall be enforced: "The property must be platted before it may be sold or any additional building permits obtained."
- All other conditions from PB 836, PB 904, and PB 1797 shall remain in force unless modified herein.
- 6. Any significant deviation from the PAD as determined by the Resource Management Director shall require a PAD amendment.
- 7. All other Greene County building, zoning, and environmental regulations shall be adhered to.





To Whom It May Concern,

City Minded, LLC, a Missouri limited liability company, owns property where an existing business operates at 3256 S Fremont Ave, 65804. This business is called The City: Salon Spas and Wellness Suites. The business model allows individual owner/operators to conduct their own businesses centered around salon, massage, beauty and wellness in a shared environment, but each owner/operator having their own space. Based on the initial success of this business, City Minded, LLC has entered into a contract to purchase property at 5000 S Highland Springs Blvd, 65809, for purposes of opening a second location.

The existing PAD that governs the property at 5000 S Highland Springs Blvd is fairly specific in its use recommendations. This is not surprising as the PAD is decades old, and at the time it was accepted our business model did not exist. A similar situation occurred when The City opened its first location on S Fremont. That property was also zoned in a planned development, which did not specifically allow (or disallow) our business use ... again because our business model didn't exist at the time the PD was written. In a fairly simple process, the City of Springfield was able to amend the PD to allow our specific business use. We would hope the same would be possible with the location at 5000 S Highland Springs Blvd.

The property at 5000 S Highland Springs Blvd is not currently connected to city sewer. However, in conversation with County officials, there are several convenient points for the property to be connected. Our ownership group is committed to connecting to sewer at the soonest practical opportunity, and discontinuing the use of the existing septic system. Beyond this, we have not been made aware of any improvements to the water service that will be needed to accommodate our business use.

A noticeable change to existing traffic patterns would not be anticipated upon The City opening in this location. Since the property sits outside of the security gates of Highland Springs, there will be no noticeable disturbance or impact to the residents of Highland Springs in terms of additional traffic inside the club itself. The nature of the business operators who occupy The City is of fairly irregular or inconsistent occupancy. Most owner/operators work by appointment only, meaning that while their appointments occur during normal business hours, they generally do not stay at the facility if they do not have scheduled appointments. As a practical matter, and after months of being open at our Fremont Ave location, we find our traffic and utilization to be similar to that of a service based office business that keeps regular client appointments, much like an attorney or accountant.

In summary, we are optimistic that this process can function much like our first location, where an amendment of the existing PAD can establish the opportunity for our business to operate successfully inside the facility at 5000 S Highland Springs Blvd.


