Currently there are approximately 35 lots for homes to be built.

Missouri Job Center update given by Mrs. Trombetta. The Build my Future event was a success. Over 2700 students participated. Other cities are modeling this event around the state and country. 05/20 the job center is holding a healthcare job fair.

Missouri Extension Center update provided by David Burton. Burton presented the Commission with the May newsletter. (Exhibit 1) Burton highlighted the report, some of the highlights included: 2019 Mo. garlic school will take place on 05/17from 8-4 at the botanical center. Bull Sale that took place at Springfield Livestock marketing center. Master Gardeners of Greene County Class of 2019 took place on 04/11-04/31.MU Extension had an audit of their books and there was no issues found.

Commission presented David Burton with a proclamation.

Top Branch Awards: GCSO Corporal Harte and Juvenile Officer Andy Sweatt were presented with awards.

County Administrator Chris Coulter updated the Commission that the pretrial supervisor position has been filled by Natalie Gomez and will begin in June. Purchasing Director Interviews will begin 05/10 and be narrowed down to 3 people at which time the Commission will make the decision. Coulter mention that all county offices will be closed on 05/08 in observation of Truman Day.

Assistant Highway Director Adam Humphries provided the Commission a copy of the April Monthly Report (Exhibit 2). Humphries highlighted district 1 crew, highlights included: repairs to Lone Oak St, improvements on FR 25 and FR 115. District 2 highlights included: 2 storm box tops on Plainview rd., brush crew requests on various farm roads in the county. Humphries also highlighted the county wide maintenance crew, special projects crew, shop and warehouse and safety. Humphries informed Commission that currently they are down on the number of seasonal mowers for 2019 and that mowing will suffer unless positions are filled. Commission suggested that they put out a release to the public in regards to needing seasonal help.

Commissioner Dixon thanked Recorder of Deeds, Cheryl Dawson, County Clerk Shane Schoeller and Director of OEM Larry Woods for helping the IS department by providing money from their budgets for items that were needed by IS that was not approved in their budget.

Office of Emergency Management Director Larry Woods provided the Commission with the April End of the Month report. (Exhibit 3) Woods highlighted the report, highlights included: Coordinated recovery efforts from Tornado incident on 04/30,88 residents and business were affected by the storm, participated in OEM mitigation plan kickoff meeting, 5 tours were lead through the PSC in April. Woods also informed the Commission of the week's upcoming weather and provided each Commissioner with a report (Exhibit 3).

Resource Management Director Kevin Barnes introduced new Storm Water Engineer Calvin to the Commission. OPS center is making progress and soon the equipment that goes on the inside will be ready for set up.

County Geologist /Cave Specialist Matt Forir informed Commission of nine new sinkhole collapses that had been reported in the last month. 8 new sinkholes have been reported as well. Forir is having a meeting with the city of Springfield as well as County reps in 2 weeks about sinkhole protocol.

Performance Bull Sale at Springfield Livestock Marketing Center Reveals Bearish Bull Market

The 93rd Southwest Missouri Beef Cattle Improvement Association's performance bull sale held March 25 at the Springfield Livestock Marketing Center proved to be very bearish according to Eldon Cole, livestock specialist with University of Missouri Extension.

The overall average was \$2,903 on 30 Angus. One Gelbvieh and five Charolais did not receive the floor price of \$2,000. Six Angus also were no sales.

Following the sale, comments among attendees seemed to indicate the last year's weather might be part of the cause for low prices.

"The short hay supply in 2018, along with the elevated price of hay and supplement needs has negatively affected beef cattle profitability resulting in a more conservative approach to bull buying," said Cole.

Some attendees also felt there had been a

significant reduction in cow herd size which may reduce the need for bulls at this time.

"Another observation is there's been a large number of bulls offered for sale this late winter and spring. Many of which are from other states," said Cole.

The bulls offered at this sale represented a collection of bulls worthy of a better than average price according to Cole.

"Most of the bulls had been genomically (DNA) evaluated which boosted the accuracy of their expected progeny differences (EPD)," said Cole.

The top price of \$6,000 was a consignment from Truman L. Wiles, Willow Springs. The bull was a son of KCF Bennett Southside. He was purchased by Brackenridge Brothers, El Dorado Springs, a consistent buyer of top bulls at this sale for 25 years.

Several bulls were priced around \$4,000. Adam Arnold, Lamar purchased one for \$4,300 from Clearwater Farm, Springfield. Two Angus bulls were taken at \$3,900. Naylor's Angus, Buffalo entered one and Blue Mound Angus, El Dorado Springs entered the other. Respective buyers were Julius Fraley, Houston and John Branham, Stella. Fraley was the volume buyer for the evening with the purchase of three bulls.

The next sale will be Oct. 28 at the Springfield Livestock Marketing Center.

The audit was conducted and all records


were found to be in great condition.




The keynote speaker was Dr. Lupita Fabregas, Missouri 4-H Program Leader, who delivered a message about connecting across cultural lines.


find the one that fits the 4-H clientele best.



OPERATIONS:

The maintenance crews have been involved in routine activities including the following:

DISTRICT 1 CREW

- Crews made necessary repairs to Lone Oak St in preparation of an asphalt overlay.
- Crews completed shoulder improvements on FR 25 and FR 115.
- Crews filled cracks in the pavement at various subdivisions in preparation of an asphalt surface treatment later this season.
- Brush cutting and stump removal operations were performed at the following locations: FR 9, FR 112, FR 39, FR 168, Village Terrace, Battlefield and FR 85. Crews also removed fallen trees and cleaned-up debris left from high winds.
- Crews made curb repairs on Long Drive and performed milling operations on Dogwood to improve drainage. Drainage work was also completed on FR 164.
- Crews performed milling and filling operations at the following locations: FR 9, FR 139 and FR 89.
- Crews milled headers in the pavement in preparation of an asphalt overlay at the following locations: FR 112, FR 125, and FR 2.
- Members of the West Side brush crew worked to clear roads of brush and downed trees during the April 30 storms. Once the west side roads were passable, the crew assisted the east side area as it was hit the hardest.
- Other tasks for the month included: trash and animal removal, street sweeping, inspections and maintenance of equipment, etc.



DISTRICT 2 CREW

- Crews replaced two storm box tops on Plainview Rd at Kimbrough and Plainview Rd west
 of Hazel St. The repairs were made in preparation of the ADA ramp work and sidewalk
 repair. The concrete contractor repaired and/or replaced ADA ramps, sidewalk panels, and
 sections of curb and gutter on Plainview Road.
- The Brush crew responded to requests of service at the following locations: FR 104, FR 156, FR 207, FR 102, FR 137, FR 2, FR 255, and FR 199.
- Crew used hot mix to patch potholes at the following locations: FR 68, FR 64, FR 199, FR 241 FR 221, FR 223, FR 181 and a driveway cut on S. FR 237.
- The backhoe crew reworked the pavement edges of FR 227 north of Rte C. Crews also cleaned the ditches and driveway drainage pipes between Rte C and FR 68.
- The crew sealed cracks in the pavement on FR 94 and on the Highway Department campus.
- Barry Stephens and Blaine Myers with the East Side crew, helped a couple in the Beverly
 Hills Subdivision rescue their pet. A call was received at GCHD about a dog trapped in the
 drainage system by some kind of varmint with no other way out. The two crew members
 removed the grate on top of the storm box to make a way out for the dog to retreat.
- Crews cleaned and treated the salt spreaders with rust inhibitors and placed them in storage.
- Erosion repair work was completed on FR 193. The crew used 4 x 8 inch rock to stabilize the area and reworked the ditches to improve the drainage.
- The new brush chipper has been put into service for the east side brush crew. The brush crew has responded to requests at the following locations: FR 174, FR 241, Woodside Way, FR 80, FR 104 and removed a walnut tree in Shadowood subdivision.
- Crews cleaned and repaired driveway drainage pipes on FR 148, FR 134, and FR 211. The backhoe crew also replaced a drainage pipe on FR 84. Crews regraded the ditch on FR 80.


Severe Storms Monday Afternoon/Evening

FACTS:

1. The applicant owns a 95.22-acre tract of vacant land just outside the city limits of Strafford, currently zoned A-1, Agriculture District.

- 2. The tract is divided by 9 acres of mapped 100-year floodplain. Any floodplain development will require the approval of the Greene County Environmental Division.
- 3. This petition is to rezone this tract to PAD, Plot Assignment District. The submitted sketch plat (Exhibit C) shows a cluster of seven (7) residential lots north of the floodplain, four (4) south of the floodplain, and two (2) commercial lots with frontage on Farm Road 104. No commercial uses are specified.
- 4. The submitted sketch plat shows one (1) new access point from Farm Road 94 and one (1) from Farm Road 104, to be shared by the residential developments on either side of the floodplain. The applicant proposes these to be private streets with cul-de-sacs.
- 5. Public water and sewer are not currently available in the area, and approved on-site wastewater systems and wells shall be required for any new constructions.
- 6. This parcel has frontage on Farm Road 94 and Farm Road 104, which are both classified as Secondary Arterials on the Greene County Major Thoroughfare Plan.
- 7. This parcel lies less than a quarter-mile from the city limits of Strafford to the east and south, just on the other side of Interstate 44, where there is a spattering of manufacturing and industrial zoning. It also lies just east of the 1992 Castle Oaks Subdivision, which is zoned A-R, Agriculture-Residence District. The rest of the surrounding area is largely vacant or agricultural tracts.

8. The 2018 Future Land Use Map shows this property to be well within the urban growth area of Strafford and outside the Urban Service Area of Springfield, with a planned industrial corridor running along the south side of I-44 between the two cities.

STAFF COMMENTS:

Staff recommends approval with conditions.

PLANNING BOARD ACTION:

The Planning Board did vote (8-0) to recommend approval of this petition at public hearing April 16, 2019, with the following conditions:

- 1. Preliminary and final plats for the property shall be approved and recorded before any development may occur. The submitted site plan (Exhibit C) shall serve as the sketch plat.
- Land uses and development on the property shall be regulated as described in the applicant's PAD report, except where modified herein.
- 3. All residential lots shall be regulated as R-1, Suburban Residence District. All commercial lots shall be regulated as C-3, Rural Commercial District.
- 4. Access from Farm Road 94 and Farm Road 104 shall meet Greene County Highway Department approval. Right-of-way shall be dedicated amounting to at least 40-ft. from centerline along both Farm Road 94 and Farm Road 104.
- 5. Any commercial entrances shall be constructed to Greene County Highway Department standards. Private streets shall be constructed to Greene County Design Standards for Public Improvements. Restrictive covenants and maintenance agreements for private streets shall be approved by the office of the Greene County Counselor and be recorded with the final plat.
- Drainage easements, stormwater detention facilities, and sediment and erosion control
 measures shall all meet Greene County Stormwater Design Standards and Zoning
 Regulations.
- 7. Any deviations from this submission, as determined by Greene County Resource Management, shall require an amendment to the PAD and approval by the Greene County Planning Board and Commission.
- 8. All Greene County Building, Zoning, and Environmental Regulations shall be adhered to.
