Monthly Recognition Awards: The Squealing Pig Award this month was awarded to Tyler Gunlock for his leadership Ash Grove involvement.

Educational Program: Pam Duitsman introduced the community development company, Noble Hill, who uses landfill gases for energy production. There is an appeal for project developers to come up with

novel ideas and plan for creating greenhouses and agriculture. The Green Circle proposal accepted by City Springfield for 1 acre. Half will be used for young farmer accelerator project and growing for large industrial food needs. An average box of produce travels 1,500 miles, this will make more of our produce grown locally. The first stage of the project will train new farmers with an MSU certificate. The second stage is an agriculture accerator with young farmers leasing land and growing produce to sell. Financing capital through FCS, USDA, FSA and SBA. Hydroponic greenhouses provide internships for local students who will sell leafy greens and herbs to retail distributors and institutional buyers. Food distribution centers keep cash and jobs in the local economy. Agroforestry and permaculture demonstrations with Extension, MSU, MDC and USDA will show case specialty crops. The first two stages will cost approximately \$11.9 million.

Rick Stenberg moved to adjourn the meeting at 1:19 pm and Tyler Gunlock seconded the motion. The idea passed unanimously.







OPERATIONS:

The maintenance crews have been involved in routine activities including the following:

DISTRICT 1 CREW

- Shoulder improvements were completed on FR 21.
- Shoulder, asphalt, and driveway repairs were completed at the following locations: FR 124, FR 64 and FR 140.
- Crews responded to the snow and ice event. Crews hauled salt and cleaned equipment after the event in preparation for the next storm.
- Brush crew responded to requests of service and removed trees out of the right-of-way at the following locations: FR 94, FR 84, FR 45, FR 156 and FR 61.
- Stump removal, side trimming and mowing are finished across the district for the year.
- Crew sealed cracks in the asphalt in Prairie View subdivision.
- Other tasks for the month included: trash and animal removal, street sweeping, inspections and maintenance of equipment, etc.

DISTRICT 2 CREW

• The crew made repairs to the ditches on FR 116 to improve drainage and removed debris from two drainage pipes in the area. Ditches and driveway pipes were cleaned along Weaver Road. The crew removed leaf litter and debris from drainage pipes in the Wildwood subdivision as well.

- The Backhoe crew added shot rock around a driveway on FR 34 to correct an erosion issue. The crew repaired soft spots on FR 62 east of FR 239, to be patched at a later date.
- Brush was trimmed in the right of way on Kissick Avenue. Flagmen were in the area to assist with traffic control during the operation.
- Hot mix patching was completed on Jameson Street. Soft spots in the pavement were repaired on FR 249.
- Crews removed debris on FR 66 that washed-out of a driveway into the street. Responded to an emergency on FR 166 west of FR 193 where dirt and rocks were spilled in the roadway. The power broom was used to clear the debris.
- The Brush crew responded to requests of service at the following locations: FR 159, FR 209, FR 156, FR 144, FR 205, FR 80 and FR 199.
- Trucks were rigged to respond to the winter weather event. Crews cleaned, repaired and inspected equipment. Salt was hauled from the Kauffman storage facility to the Highway Department campus.
