

Foxhole Technology of Springfield Gets Government Contract With Help from PTAC Counselor at SBDC

After serving in the army for 27 years, Wes Hester wasn't ready to stop serving his community upon retirement. In 2007, Hester decided to start his own IT Technology engineering firm, Foxhole Technology.

By 2008, he was ready to open his doors and provide cybersecurity to the US Department of Defense, as well as other federal and civilian agencies. Now, his team maintains 24/7 cyber hygiene and security for organizations all over the world, including the US Department of Education. Hester also employs many veterans, giving them the chance to continue aiding their

Before he could get started, however, he knew he needed help. He had the technology aspect covered, but knew nothing about business development and networking. After doing tons of research, a mentor recommended the Missouri Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) in Springfield, Missouri.

He worked with Allen Waldo, who provided counseling and information on taking advantage of veteran-owned business opportunities.

Hester worked to receive his Service Disabled Veteran Owned Small Business certification and got started attending networking events. PTAC helped him understand accounting and made seminar and training

suggestions. "It's been great," Hester said. "I think the quality of people [at PTAC] is really good and dynamic. I recommend

it to any and every small business."

One of the biggest things PTAC was able to help Hester with before officially opening Foxhole Technology was comprehending federal contracts. Waldo explained the mechanics of federal contracting, cost proposals, and the price to win strategy.

Because of the strong building blocks Hester received from PTAC, Foxhole Technology has been able to expand to having employees in 18 states and overseas with their headquarters in Fairfax, Virginia. Along with cybersecurity, the company also specializes in testing and evaluation, program acquisition and management, and systems and software engineering, among other things. They also develop and maintain programs that can analyze big amounts of complicated data and put it into comprehensible information.

Foxhole Technology has not seen the end of its growth.

Foxhole Technology has not seen the end of its growth. Despite struggles concerning industry change and a shrinking pipeline of trained professionals, they are making changes to combat every challenge.

As Hester works to grow the company, he still meets with Waldo for guidance and help. PTAC continually finds new opportunities and training for Hester, and he knows he can go to them with questions and research assistance.

By law, the Greene County MU Extension Council must annually publish its Income and Expense Financial Report for all of the restricted and unrestricted accounts (at right).

In 2020, this report became easier to understand because we began managing the accounts for our Master Gardeners and Master Naturalists chapters as "separate" checking accounts. Each of those accounts have income and expenses that are not part of the operational budget for our office. We value these accounts and grants because they do make additional programing possible.

Thanks to two 4-H grants and a leadership grant, nearly \$11,000 in program expenses were paid out of restricted accounts which greatly benefited our office budget and make it possible to finish 2019 in the black.

University of Missouri Extension programs in Greene County are funded by county, state and federal appropriations. The Greene County Commission provides local extension funding for office expenses, clerical salaries and travel expenses of specialists who conduct programs in Greene County.



2019 Highlights

4th County Commission Ag Tour

Diversity of agriculture was the theme of the Greene County Commission Agriculture Tour. Stops included an Irish Dexter cattle farm, agriculture program at Willard High School, a crop operation north of Willard, Sac River Stables and a tour of Hiland Dairy.

96th Ag Production Conference

Over 90 people attended the 96th Agriculture Production Conference and Greene County Soil and Water Conservation District Annual Meeting March 7 at Springfield Livestock Marketing Center. Wesley Tucker presented "Estate and Succession Planning for the Family Farm" and we hosted a panel discussion focused on "Making Local Foods Profitable for the Farm."

MU Extension Ag Tax Schools

Twenty accountants attended Springfield training and received updates on the Tax Cuts

and Jobs Act legislation individual taxpayer issues, agricultural and natural resources topics, IRS rules and regulations, business issues, retirement issues, cybersecurity, limited liability companies, trusts and estates, religious organization tax issues, and ethics.

94th Tested Bull Sale

The 94th all-breed performance bull sale was held Oct. 28 at Springfield Livestock Marketing Center. A total of 34 tested bulls were offered. Nearly 200 people attended the sale and the educational program offered by MU Extension specialists. Thirty bulls sold for an average of \$2878.

Pesticide Applicator Training

Greene County hosted training for a private pesticide applicator license on Feb. 14. Tim Schnakenberg was the instructor. There were 38 in attendance and another 22 visited our offices during the year to watch a video and complete paperwork for a license renewal. Under Missouri law, this training provides certification to obtain a Private Pesticide Applicators License for Missouri agricultural producers and is designed to make sure that pesticides are applied safety

Farm Visits and Questions

Our agriculture specialist made a total of 92 farm visits in the county to offer solutions and assistance as well as documenting over 200 calls from county land owners seeking answers to various agriculture related concerns.

6th Annual Salute to Century Farms

We raised \$800 for the office and \$587 for 4-H and had our largest crowd (132) in the history of this program. We also got to honor six family farms, one which had remained in the same family for over 180 years.

AGRICULTURE / STRIKEFORCE GRANT

2019 Highlights

StrikeForce Farmer Development

The StrikeForce Project targets areas that need an economic boost and will benefit from the expansion of small farms and on-farm businesses. The funding has expanded educational opportunities to farmers in StrikeForce counties to make their operations more profitable and efficient, while emphasizing conservation of natural resources. These areas have benefited from the increased educational offerings that financial assistance from NRCS sponsored programs has provided for workshops and conservation practices for specialty crops.

Twilight Farm Walks

Twilight Farm Walks are educational meetings that occur throughout the year, intended to provide producers the opportunity to get a firsthand look at ongoing vegetable and fruit production. Horticulture plots are featured, including high tunnels and open

field. Participants experience some of the latest horticultural research and visit with researchers and specialists that provide instruction and techniques to support farmer development.

What is Strikeforce?

The StrikeForce project has introduced beginning and advanced specialty crop producers to new production skills, available resources, new marketing opportunities, additional trainings and technical assistance, and developed a network of producers that keep in touch and work together to improve production and profitability.

Farm Safety Workshop

The Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Produce Safety Alliance (PSA) training is a standardized national training curriculum in produce food safety, approved by the Food and Drug Administration to meet the training requirement for farms subject to the FSMA Produce Safety Rule. The 8 hour training curriculum includes modules on FSMA, worker health and hygiene, soil amendments of biological origin, domestic animal and wildlife issues, production and postharvest use of water, postharvest handling and sanitation, and food safety plans/traceability. The training team for the FSMA PSA training includes an AFDO-certified lead trainer, and additional trainers certified in the FSMA PSA curriculum. The lead trainer completes the training application packet, organizes the training team, organizes local arrangements, delivers one or more of the training modules, conducts the impact survey, completes the application, and distributes the training certificates to attendees post-training. Training team members deliver one or more of the training modules.

Business development program specialists and business counselors with MU Extension and the Missouri Small Business Development Centers, Missouri Procurement Technical Assistance Centers, Missouri Environmental Program, Missouri Career Options Project, and the Missouri Market Development program served Greene County residents and their companies with business start-up and management counseling, and other assistance. Participants and clients include:

- Small business owners in the service, construction and retail industries
- Prospective entrepreneurs
- Non-profit organizations
- Displaced workers

Successful businesses promote growth and stability in the local and state economy. When you support MU Extension's Business Development Program, enterprising Missourians receive information and training to start, run and expand businesses. This increased business activity creates jobs, increases consumer demand, promotes economic development and generates much needed tax revenue.

SBDC Gives Owners of 37 North Expeditions Confidence to Move Forward in 2019

37 North was founded by Springfield-native Danny Collins and his wife Cristina Bustamante in April 2018. The company specializes in guided tours and is dedicated to helping the communities of Springfield, Branson, and northwest Arkansas explore the Ozarks.

All the planning and details are handled by 37 North and the trips can include everything from a simple hike to horseback riding or paddleboarding, kayaking, and even astronomy lessons.

Soon, he reached out to the eFactory, a resource for startups that was created by Missouri State University's (MSU) IDEA

Commons. Through the eFactory, Collins met Lance Coffman, a business consultant with the Missouri Small Business Development Center (SBDC) at MSU and located within the eFactory. The SBDC is a joint program partner with, and gets funding from, University of Missouri Extension.

With Coffman's help, Collins took part in a spring 2018 feasibility study, a service offered through the local Missouri SBDC where MSU's entrepreneurship students examine business proposals and conduct feasibility studies. Once the analysis was complete, Coffman assisted Collins with advertising, bookkeeping, and pricing for the business. After eight months of planning, 37 North opened and began offering their first tours.

Collins once again sought assistance from the SBDC when it came time to purchase a company vehicle. He admits the prospect was intimidating, but Coffman and Sandra Smart-Winegar, an SBDC business consultant, assisted him by reviewing the company's options and providing resources to allow Collins to make a confident decision that coincided with his business goals.

"I was nervous about the decision," he concedes. "But the SBDC gave me confidence in the choice. It's been a great resource and a huge help."

As 37 North continues to grow, Collins notes that he has loved every aspect of the business.

"It's been a blast," exclaims Collins. "I never imagined we would be anything besides a small startup and I'm excited for the future."

2019 Highlights

Leadership Ash Grove

When the class began we had 18 attend. Participants grew as individuals. Networking proved to be powerful. Participants learned more about their community and engaged with it in new ways. Best of all, class members proposed community projects including: "Main Street Nights," a drug take

back program, a bicycle rodeo for youth and welcome bags with information about the city for people who sign up for new water service. This program is going to be repeated in 2020. Plans are underway for the development of a Leadership Republic, Leadership Willard and Leadership Mt. Vernon.

Greene County Extension Council

Our county council members are engaged and serving statewide. We also provide council members with education at meetings. These educational programs give specialists facetime with council members and confidence in their programming.

"Good Neighbor Day" Campaign

Over 8,000 postcards were funded and sent to every home in Republic to encourage outreach on "National Good Neighbor Day." Projects ranged from delivering cookies to neighbors and hosting "donuts on the driveway" to a neighborhood BBQ. Republic police are preparing to launch a new neighborhood watch program.

Southwest Region News Service

The program was reduced this year to biweekly to open a window of opportunity for other programming. We still sent out over 400 releases to our 4,800 subscribers which includes media outlets in the four-state area. This service has been a valuable educational program unique to Missouri.

Elevate Middle School Program

This afterschool program is for middle school students in Republic. The fall of 2019 session was funded by a local grant. We had 124 students sign up with an average weekly attendance of 74. The program provided a forum for a Generation Rx program by students in the UMKC School of Pharmacy. In 2020 our specialists will continue to provide some 4-H programming at Elevate.

Mizzou Leadership Network

The alumni network is a quarterly program highlighting Mizzou grads in local leadership positions. Attendees learn leadership lessons from featured guests during a Q&A session. The goal is to expand our local alumni network but also tie alumni, specialists and the public together with leadership lessons. Our guests in 2019 were County Commissioner John Russell, Springfield banker Robin Robeson and 417 Magazine Editor Logan Aguire.

Mizzou Founders Day 2019

The first joint Mizzou Founders Day and Greene County Extension Annual Meeting was held in February 2019. Guest speakers from the Mizzou campus attended making this educational event a unique partnership between Mizzou Athletics, Mizzou Alumni and Greene County MU Extension.

FAMILY NUTRITION PROGRAM

2019 Highlights

As reported by Terri Fossett, Sherri Hull, Randi Williams, Marty Wood, Myrna Stark and Myra Dickensheet

The Family Nutrition Program (FNP) statewide brought \$9,595,006.00 in federal

funds to Missouri. These funds were used to provide nutrition education to 897,375
Supplemental Nutrition
Assistance Program recipients and eligible Missourians.
Statewide, there were 3,283,220 educational contacts (2,578,418 indirect). Indirect contacts are reached through newsletters, health fairs, food pantries and the Show Me Nutrition help line.

Participants in FNP become more aware of nutrition, make healthier meal and snack choices. eat breakfast more often, are more willing to try new foods, increase their physical activity and in general make healthier food choices. Those who practice healthy eating and activity behaviors are more likely to enjoy a high quality of life as an adult and into old age. A healthy labor force is critical to attracting and keeping jobs in Missouri. In addition, this programming helps to reduce healthcare costs over the participant's lifetime, saving taxpayers money in reduced public healthcare benefits.

"It has been a successful year in Greene County for the family nutrition education program," said Terri Fossett, regional nutrition director. "We look forward in 2020 to more programming opportunities and continued progress in helping to

improve the lives of Missouri families."

During 2019, 4,449 youth and 29,120 adults in Greene County (total of 33,569) were served through schools, community groups and agencies by MU Extension's Family Nutrition Education Program.

2019 Highlights

Chaired 2019 State Master Gardener Conference in Columbia, Missouri

Attendees included over 100 Master Gardeners from Missouri and surrounding states. Feedback and conference evaluations were highly favorable of utilizing MU Extension professionals for educational sessions. As a result, this format will be repeated during the 2020 state MG conference.

Master Gardeners of Greene County

Highlights from the Chapter are included in a separate, comprehensive end-of-year annual report. But as one example, members of the Master Gardeners staff a horticulture hotline at the Springfield Botanical Center. They receive training from Horticulture Specialist Kelly McGowan. Master Gardener Patty Garrett is chair of the hotline and Kathy Rapp is scheduler. The numbers are in for 2019 and our volunteers were busy! The hotline took 764 inquiries this year from 26 counties around the state. We also took 295 calls and 39 emails as due to KY3 Ask a Master Gardener segments.

2019 Blueberry School

Had 65 attendees from 5 states attended the 2 day Blueberry School. Impact statements included the following: "I am a new blueberry grower and I enjoy networking with and learning from farmers who have been growing blueberries for many years."

2019 Garlic School

Had 67 attendees attended the 2019 Missouri Garlic School. The keynote speaker was Crystal Stewart, state vegetable specialist with Cornell University Extension. The purpose of the 2019 Garlic School was to introduce garlic as a viable specialty crop in Missouri and to assist current growers with up-to-date research and growing information to increase yields.

2019 Master Naturalist Training

Had 21 new Master Naturalists complete the Greene County training. Positive impact statements include: "As a result of going through the training, I have an entire new appreciation for the natural world." "I now find ways to be more involved with conservation efforts." "I am a teacher and will use what I have learned in my classroom." New members are shown in the group photo below.



HUMAN DEVELOPMENT

Available Programs Submitted by Amber Allen

Human Development and Family Science looks at how people develop through the lifespan and how individuals develop within the context of the family and society. Allen's goal is to provide multifaceted programming across the lifespan that educates participants on topics related to them as an individual; interpersonal relationships; and brings understanding to individuals that they are connected to the communities they engage with daily. Various programs are available to help achieve this goal. Listed below are a few of the programs Allen will focus on in 2020.

Boost Your Brain and Memory

The class uses a whole-person approach that helps you form new habits to live a healthier lifestyle, remember things better, be more organized, pay closer attention and regulate your emotions. Each participant will receive a workbook including memory exercises, tips on nutrition and exercise, and summaries of evidence-based research on brain health.

Focus On Kids

Helps divorced and separated parents learn how to support their children through the divorce and how to work together in coparenting their children. Focus on Kids satisfies Missouri law that requires parents who are divorcing or filing a motion to modify the original divorce decree to attend an educational parenting program.

Green Dot

Green Dot is a prevention program that seeks to reduce power based personal violence (child abuse, stalking, dating, domestic, and sexual violence) and is predicated on the notion that all community members have a role in reducing violence.

Mental Health First Aid (Youth)

YMHFA gives community members, parents, and caring adults an opportunity to better understand what mental health is, what some of the common diagnosis are, and how to respond to youth who might have a crisis. It reduces the misconception many people may have about mental health. It gives individuals in our communities the skills to handle a crisis in a way that is safe, and inspires hope for the youth. YMHFA is a framework for providing immediate support to the youth and also getting them connected to other professionals and caring adults.

Taking Care of You

Taking Care of You is a multi-session program offering practical strategies and experiences to help you deal with the stress in your life. Managing life's challenges in a healthy way allows you to take better care of yourself and your overall health.

Cooking Matters

Cooing Matters is a series of classes that are designed to empower families at risk of hunger with the skills, knowledge, and confidence to make healthy and affordable meals. Each of the 6 sessions is two hours long where participants will learn to cook a meal to eat during class and are then sent home with groceries to cook the meal for their family. During the past year Cooking Matters was taught for 4 series and has created great partnerships for MU Extension. The class has been taught in partnership with Pregnancy Care Center, The Greene County Youth Academy, and a continuing partnership to teach classes at Central Assembly of God through Victory Mission. Classes are set up for 2020 to teach Cooking Matters.

Fall Prevention Classes

MU Extension Nutrition and Health Field Specialist teach a variety of fall prevention classes for older adults for every level of physical activity. In Greene County we offer Stay Strong, Stay Healthy, A Matter of Balance, Walk with Ease, and Tai Chi for Arthritis. These classes help older adults learn about how to avoid preventable falls and build strength in their muscles that will also help reduce the chance of having a fall. In 2019 these classes were offered in senior centers across Greene County.

Food Preservation


Hands on Food preservation classes are also taught in Greene County. Sessions include topics such as Sweet Spreads, Dehydrating, Canning Salsas and Fruits, In a Pickle, Pressure Canning Basics, and Harvesting and Storing Fresh Vegetables. In 2019 classes were offered on Sweet Spreads and Dehydrating with great success of participants canning and dehydrating in class and getting to try the products that they created.

Self-Management Classes

Chronic Disease and Diabetes Self-Management classes assists in maintaining quality of life when faced with chronic medical conditions. Self-management classes are taught in partnership with the Regional Arthritis Centers. In 2019 these classes were offered in Greene County at Senior Centers and at Mercy Hospital. This program was developed by Stanford University and is funded by the Arthritis Foundation.

Health Rocks

Taught a "Health Rocks" curriculum as part of the community-led afterschool program for middle schools students in Republic known as Elevate. The same program will continue in 2020.

Workforce Solutions KOLR-10

KOLR-10 TV segments are beneficial to highlighting Missouri's workforce topics for businesses and communities. 4-H For All

4-H for All began through a partnership between the Greene County Juvenile Office and University of Missouri Extension Council of Greene County in January 2019. The mission of 4-H for All is aligned with 4-H, which is to develop citizenship, leadership, responsibility and life skills of youth through experiential learning programs and a positive youth development approach. What makes the program unique is services are provided to youth at risk in an urban area that typically would not have the opportunity to experience 4 -H programs. Justin Kastning, Youth Program Associate, is primarily responsible for this program. This program has already received statewide recognition, including the Reaching Diverse Audiences Award and Vice

Chancellor's Diversity Award for both team and individual. Kastning is currently working with four different groups of youth in the program. Due to the success of the program, additional opportunities to expand programming are currently under review. 


