#### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2

Proposed by the 96th General Assembly (First Regular Session) HJR 2

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to ensure:

- That the right of Missouri citizens to express their religious beliefs shall not be infringed;
- That school children have the right to pray and acknowledge God voluntarily in their schools; and
- That all public schools shall display the Bill of Rights of the United States Constitution.

It is estimated this proposal will result in little or no costs or savings for state and local governmental entities.



#### CITY OF SPRINGFIELD QUESTION 1

Shall the City of Springfield, Missouri, continue a sales tax of one-eighth of one percent for transportation purposes to fund high-priority transportation improvements which include the following: Mt. Vernon Street and Orchard Crest Avenue intersection improvements; construct a Chestnut Expressway bridge over the railroad near U.S. Route 65; replace the Battlefield Road bridge over U.S. Route 65 and construct a new diverging diamond interchange: widen the existing bridges on Republic Road over James River Freeway to provide capacity, bike lanes, and sidewalks; widen Weaver Road between National Place Boulevard and Campbell Avenue to three lanes: widen Republic Road from Scenic Avenue to Golden Avenue to five lanes with curb and gutters: accelerate critical Bridge Repair and Replacement projects at various locations; Pavement Preservation/Major Resurfacing and Rehabilitation projects; Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) Intermodal/Alternative projects: Transportation projects including sidewalks, bike routes, transit, and rail crossings improvements; Turn Lane Safety and Capacity projects; and other highpriority transportation investments related to economic development and quality of life enhancements through shared funding with the County, State, and Federal agencies and developers to advance high-priority transportation projects, with the tax to sunset in four years?

(Note: This will not increase the current one-eighth of one percent transportation sales tax.)

Shall Section 13.1 of the Springfield City Charter be amended to remove the February Primary election date for candidates running for the offices of Springfield City Council?



#### QUESTION CHARTER AMENDMENT NO. 2012-2

Shall Sections 14.1, 14.3, 14.6, 14.8 and 14.9 be amended to change the Initiative Petition process to require the following: 1. In order to begin the initiative petition process, five (5) qualified voters of the City shall form a Petitioners' Committee, that shall submit the proposed petition to the City Clerk, who shall then obtain the advisory legal opinion of the City Attorney as to the legality of the subject matter of the initiative petition, and the Clerk shall also obtain a fiscal summary from the City Director of Finance that contains the anticipated cost to the City to implement the initiative petition as well as the source of funds that the City anticipates utilizing to cover the cost of implementation of the initiative; 2. A petitioners' committee will have one (1) year from the date the City Clerk issues the Initiative Petition forms to the Petitioners' Committee to return the signed Initiative Petition to the City Clerk; Allows Council, by a vote of at least seven (7) members, to amend or delete facially invalid language or correct typographical errors from said initiative petition prior to the election at which the initiative will be passed upon by the voters: Sets as the election date for such ordinance to be the earlier of: a date upon which another issue or candidate race submitted by City Council is to be passed upon by the voters; or, no later than one (1) year from the date that council caused the initiative to be submitted to a popular vote: 5. Allows the Petitioners' Committee to withdraw the initiative petition for any reason up to the 6th Tuesday prior to the scheduled election; 6. The ballot question for the initiative petition shall contain a fiscal note, prepared by the City Director of Finance and comprised of not more than 50 words, and; 7. If such initiative ordinance is approved by the voters, said ordinance cannot be amended or repealed by council for six (6) months after the date election result is certified by council, from months seven (7) through twelve (12) such initiative ordinance can only be amended or repealed by council with a unanimous vote of the entire council, and from the thirteenth month thereafter, can be amended by an affirmative vote of at least seven (7) members of Council.

Shall Section 14.1 be amended to change the Initiative Petition process to require that an Initiated Ordinance may be submitted to the City Council by a petition signed by the qualified electors of the City equal in number to at least seven-percent of the total number of persons registered to vote at the last general municipal election in April?
